# Tornado Preparedness Go-Bag:

Go-Bags are small, easy-to-carry bags that contain items unique to yourself and/or your family. These bags can be carried with you when seeking shelter prior to a tornado warning. In the event of tornadic destruction, these Go-Bags will have basic essentials that are personal to your needs. Be prepared before severe weather threatens and pack a Go-Bag.

#### Contents of a Go-Bag could include:

- Medications
- Small first aid kit
- Bottled water
- Flashlight
- Weather Radio
- Feminine products
- Small blanket or jacket
- Extra batteries for flashlight
- Personal Identification
- Glasses and contact solution
- Infant diapers, food, and/or formula for babies or small children

# TORNADO SAFETY GUIDE



## What are Tornadoes?

Tornadoes are deadly, unpredictable storms that can affect anyone, anywhere and at any time. Tornadoes are violent, rotating columns of air that extend from a thunderstorm to the ground. The southeastern portion of the United States, including the Poarch Creek Community, has a greater risk for tornadoes. It is important to know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning.

### **Know the Difference!**

#### <u> Tornado Watch:</u>

Be prepared! Atmospheric conditions are favorable for the development of severe thunderstorms capable of producing tornadoes.

#### Tornado Warning:

Take shelter! Either a severe thunderstorm has developed and has produced a tornado or radar has indicated intense low-level rotation in the presence of atmospheric conditions conducive to tornado development.

## Know the location of your local Tornado Shelters or designate a safe place inside your home.

In the event of a tornado warning, take shelter in an interior room on the lowest level of your home away from doors and/or windows.

# What can you do before and during a tornado?

 <u>Be Weather-Ready</u>: Check your local forecast daily and listen to your NOAA Weather Radio.



<u>Electronic Weather Alerts:</u> Download weather apps for your local area and enable your push notifications for weather alerts. (Tribal Emergency Management recommends *Saf-T-Net*; available for free.)

- <u>Pay Attention</u>: Always stay weatheraware! Pay attention to weather conditions throughout the day and night.
- <u>Plan Ahead</u>: Have a plan for yourself and your family prior to a severe weather threat. Communication is key!
- <u>Take Shelter</u>: During severe weather events, stay indoors and take shelter immediately following a Tornado Warning. Be sure to get down low and cover your head!
- <u>Stay Aware:</u> Remain in your safe place and call for help if you need assistance. After a tornado passes, debris and fallen power lines remain a danger to citizens within the area.
