


Don't Do Drugs! Live Above The Influence!

The 2013 Close Up participants from the Poarch Creek Indians decided to focus on drugs; a danger that effects Tribal Members of all ages and social status and can lead to destructive behaviors such as addictions and dependence, unemployment, high number of high school dropouts, adult & juvenile crime, bad health, and domestic violence.

Their suggestions to stop drug use in our Tribe are:

- No Tribal benefits without a drug test.
- If failed the cost of another test is taken out of Per Capita check
- Failed a third time, money will be taken out of check to send you to Rehab and remaining money will be given to you 6 months after being sober.

Newsletter Information & Deadlines

The *Poarch Creek News* is the official newsletter of the Poarch Band of Creek Indians. The newsletter is furnished to Tribal Members, widows/widowers of deceased Tribal Members, Tribal entities, and representatives of agencies providing funding, i.e. IHS, NRCS, and official representatives of other Federally Recognized Indian Tribes at no cost. Non-Tribal Members interested in receiving the *Poarch Creek News* must pay an annual subscription fee.

The Poarch Creek News is generated on a monthly basis by the Government Relations Department of the Poarch Band of Creek Indians at the direction/discretion of the Tribal Council to provide important news, updates, and information to Tribal Members. We reserve the right to edit or refuse any item submitted for publication.

The *Poarch Creek News* is generated one month prior to the month of publication. The deadline to submit information to be published in the newsletter is the 10th of the month prior to the month of publication. If the 10th falls on a weekend or

holiday, the deadline is extended to the next business day.

Due to space limitations, submitted articles should be limited to 500 words or less. Photos are limited to one photo per article submission. When forwarding a photo for publication in the newsletter, please be aware of the quality of the photo you are sending. We all want to look our best when we see ourselves in print! Over the past year we have received several photos that were of poor quality and did not publish well. If possible, do not use photos from a newspaper or magazine. If there is a photo in a newspaper or magazine that you would like to use, please contact the publication and ask them for a digital copy of the original. When using copiers or scanners to scan your photo, please check your settings. When using a scanner that gives you the option, please set the resolution at 300 pixels per inch. If all else fails, you can bring or send the original photo to the Poarch Creek News; it will be scanned, saved, and returned to you.

Submissions such as obituaries, birth announcements, wedding & engagement announcements, and birthday & anniversary wishes are limited to Tribal Members & spouses, First Generation & spouses, and those living in a Tribal Member household.

Obituaries/Family Thanks will be published if submitted by the last business day of the <u>second month</u> immediately following the death.

Birth Announcements will be published as long as the information is received by the last business day of the month immediately following the birth.

Engagement/Wedding Announcements will be published as long as the information is received by the last business day of the month immediately following the engagement/wedding.

Birthday & Anniversary Wishes may be published the month before, the month of, or the month after the birthday/anniversary. Birthday wishes are limited to 30 words or less, excluding name and birth date.

GULF COAST CANCER CENTERS ENCOURAGES YOU TO KNOW THE FACTS

When you hear the word "cancer," what instantly comes to your mind? Is it fear or hopelessness? Do you get a pit in your stomach because you are scared that it could happen to you?

Gulf Coast Cancer Centers would like for you to KNOW THE FACTS.

In 2013, about 239,000 American men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer, which is the most common cancer found in men, other than skin cancer. Prostate cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in men behind lung cancer. About 17% of men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer at some point during his lifetime. Even though a man has a 1 in 6 chance of developing Prostate cancer in his lifetime, only 1 man in 34 will actually die because of the cancer.

Prostate cancer occurs most often in older men, age 65 and over. Men who are at a higher risk of developing this type of cancer should begin regular screenings at the age of 45. Those men at an even higher risk, like those who have several close relatives who had Prostate cancer at an early age, should begin testing at 40.

How would you know if you had prostate cancer? The number one symptom surprisingly is - no symptom. Prostate cancer can be confirmed by an elevated prostate-specific antigen (PSA) score. PSA is a protein produced by cells of the Prostate Gland or of Prostate cancer. However, irregularities in your urine, such as trouble urinating or blood in your urine, can offer warning signs in the later stages of the cancer growth. In order to detect whether or not you could have this form of cancer,

At Gulf Coast Cancer Centers, we provide regular screenings for our community to catch cancer in its earliest stages giving the best chance to cure it. When prostate cancer is diagnosed, the pathologists will assign a Gleason Score, which helps to predict the aggressiveness of the cancer. Ranging from 2 to 10, the Gleason score helps your doctor determine treatment options. Depending on the risk level, a CT or bone scan is then performed to further identify treatment options.

If cancer is detected, there are many treatment options available. We provide our patients with treatment options based on the type of risk by looking at their PSA value, stage of cancer, and Gleason score, as well as estimated longevity. The following are treatment options are available to patients:

- Repeat biopsies detect unfavorable changes in the Gleason score.
- As men age, their PSA levels can normally go up, even if you have no prostate cancer.
- Surgery
- Radical Prostatectomy: an operation to remove the prostate gland and some of the tissue around it.

With brachytherapy, radioactive "seeds" are permanently implanted into the prostate gland to deliver a prescribed dose of radiation directly to the cancer cells, decreasing the risk of radiating surrounding healthy tissue and organs.

KIDS FEEDING KIDS

The Boys and Girls Club Mentoring Program places a high priority on community service and fund raising activities designed to teach youth to identify local challenges and seek solutions. Working together and sharing with others is a vital part of becoming a productive and caring citizen. With approval from the Poarch Creek Tribal Boys and Girls Club Board of Directors and the Program Administrators, our mentor/mentee team (Arelene Mack-Mentor, Jolene Black and Phenix Crews-Mentees) selected a Peanut Butter and Jelly community service project and named it "Kids Feeding Kids."

After lengthy discussion, we dedicated ourselves to collecting Peanut Butter & Jelly donations for 60 days (November 16, 2012, through January 14, 2013). Sickness caused our original completion date to be pushed back to January 31st which was our day for using donated funds (since some people would give us money but not their peanut butter and jelly) to purchase the items wherever we could receive the best value for our dollars. Our goal was ambitious: 180 jars of Peanut Butter (18 ounces or more) and 90 jars of Jelly (any size). In the early days, we sometimes wondered if we would make our goal.

Life skills learned include:

- Identifying and solving community challenges.
- Working with others to pool resources to promote strength through unity.
- Sharing and caring for others to put feet to our faith.
 Learning thankfulness for being citizens in America which is a plentiful land.
- Food economics for learning unit cost per ounce and cost per serving.
- Purchasing experience to use donated funds to obtain best food value for the dollar.
- Label reading to learn the nutrition value of foods.
- Research to find out nutritional benefits of Peanut Butter.

Pursuant to Section 22-3-6 of the Tribal Election Code, notice is hereby given that the 2013 Tribal Council Election shall be held on Saturday, June 1, 2013 at the Community Service Building (PCI SAIL Center). Voting will be held from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Election results will be posted at the Tribal Center on the Community Bulletin Board, and published in the July Tribal Newsletter.

In the 2013 election, the General Council will directly elect the Secretary, Treasurer and one at-large Tribal Council member. Anyone wishing to be a candidate for this year's election must complete a written statement of candidacy with the Election Board no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 2, 2013.

Walk-in voting will be held beginning Friday, May 17,

2013 through Friday, May 31, 2013 in the Community Services Building (PCI SAIL Center). This does include Saturday, May 25, 2013. Walk-in voting times will be from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily, with the exception that we will be closed on Saturday and Sunday, May 18 and 19, and on Sunday and Monday, May 26 and 27, 2013. Also, on the last Friday, May 31, 2013 the hours will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Tribal members may vote by absentee by completing and submitting an Absentee Ballot Request. The Absentee ballot request form will be posted on the Tribal Website and will be available at the Tribal Center. For your convenience, a copy of Request for Absentee Ballot and Letter of Candidacy will be incorporated in the April and May issues of the Poarch Creek News.

TRIBE DONATES TO ATMORE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

The Poarch Band of Creek Indians has donated \$964,000 to Atmore Community Hospital (ACH) in Escambia County, Alabama. The hospital provides a range of health care services to the City of Atmore and the Tribal community, including vital emergency room services. The presentation was made by the Tribal Council Members as a result of a Resolution from the Tribal Council during a special ceremony held Jan. 24 at the hospital.

"We are thrilled that we are able to help out our local

hospital, especially in these tough economic times. The Tribal Council realizes how important quality healthcare is, and that every person deserves to receive the best care available. We believe this donation will only enhance that quality of care that is already being provided by Atmore Community Hospital." said Tribal Chairman Buford L. Rolin.

An initial donation of \$484,000 will be used for renovations and equipment to the hospital and emergency room, with no less than \$150,000 of the donation to be used to renovate the emergency room. The Tribe will donate \$40,000 a month for a year, with the option for the Tribe to make an additional donation to match money collected from a community supported fundraising event.

"This is an especially difficult time for rural hospitals across the nation. This gift from the Tribe will allow us to make some much-needed improvements to our facility's equipment and technology," said John Tucker, ACH vice president and administrator. "We are very appreciative that the Tribe has once again demonstrated its commitment and extraordinary generosity to organizations in our community."







OPPORTUNITY FOR AGRICULTURAL ASSISTANCE IN FLORIDA

USDA/NRCS News Release

As submitted by David Elliott, NRCS Tribal Liaison

The 2008 Farm Bill was recently extended by Congress until September. This extension has allowed the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Florida to add an additional chance for producers to improve water and air quality, build healthier soil, improve forest lands, conserve energy, enhance organic operations, and achieve other environmental benefits.

"Adding an additional ranking date is going to give more producers time to submit their applications and help them get started with implementing the practices they need to benefit the natural resources on their operations," said NRCS acting state conservationist Roney Gutierrez.

Interested producers should visit their local NRCS service center now to receive more information on the:

- *Organic initiative*--helps producers install conservation practices on USDA certified organic operations or those working toward organic certification.
- Seasonal high tunnel initiative--helps producers install high tunnels designed to extend the growing season, increase productivity, keep plants at a steady temperature and conserve water and energy.
- *On-farm energy initiative*--helps producers conserve energy on their operations.

• *Longleaf pine initiative*--helps private landowners improve the sustainability and profitability of Longleaf pine forest ecosystems.

They can then apply for conservation technical assistance and possible cost-share funding opportunities. Applications must be filed no later than March 15, 2013, to be eligible for this year's funding.

Although applications are accepted on a continuous basis, the March 15th date has been set to make FY 2013 funding decisions for these special initiatives. Producers may continue to apply for all funded programs throughout the year.






