Word Limitations Due to space limitations articles submitted for publication should be limited to 500 words or less. Birthday wishes are limited to 30 words or less, excluding the name and date in the title of the birthday wish.

Photo Submissions: Photos are limited to one per article submission. Please submit photos in PDF or high resolution .jpg format. Distasteful or inappropriate photos will not be published. Original photos may be brought in or sent to the *Poarch Creek News*; photos will be scanned, saved, and returned.

Obituaries/Family Thanks will be published if submitted by the last business day of the <u>second month</u> immediately following the death.

In Loving Memory submissions may be published the month before, the month of, or the month after the birthday of the deceased or the anniversary of the death of the deceased.

Birth Announcements will be published as long as the information is received by the last business day of the month immediately following the birth.

Engagement/Wedding Announcements will be published as long as the information is received by the last business day of the month immediately following the engagement/wedding.

It is very important to keep your Tribal Census information up to date. When preparing the newsletter for publication each month an updated Head Of Household mailing list is obtained from Tribal Enrollment to ensure that the address information is current and up-to-date.

Unfortunately each month the Post Office returns numerous newsletters that are undeliverable due to incorrect or incomplete addresses, no mail receptacle, individual moved and left no forwarding addresses, etc. These newsletters are held for one month after publication, if the individual does not claim their newsletter, it is

A MOMENT WITH THE TRIBAL HAIR AUGUST, 2014

Summer is officially here! This month started off with the celebration of the 4th of July. I am proud to know that generations of Poarch Creek Indians have served in the military defending our country. Thank you to all of our service men and women for the countless sacrifices you've made to protect our independence.

July was certainly a busy month, especially for our Tribal Youth. They represented the Tribe well at the NAYO tournament in Cherokee, North Carolina, the United National Indian Tribal Youth (UNITY) Annual Conference in Portland, Oregon, and at the Alabama Coushatta Pow Wow in Kinder, Louisiana. Also, more than 200 Tribal Youth are active participants at the Boys and Girls Club. This summer, they will be traveling to a variety of places including the Tribe's Magnolia Branch Wildlife Reserve, the Museum of Mobile, the Gulf Breeze Zoo, and many others. This entity does an outstanding job of providing our children with amazing experiences.

Your Tribal Council has been hard at work for you! We had an enrollment working session during July to discuss options for enrollment, sustainability of the Tribe, and possible amendments to the Tribal Constitution. Our current Tribal Membership is 3,069 of which 314 members are 18 years or younger. Additionally, the Special Election for the Vice Chair position will be announced very soon.

On August 11, 1984, the United States Government, Department of Interior, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs acknowledged that the Poarch Band of Creek Indians exists as an "Indian Tribe." To date, the Poarch Creek Indians is the only federally recognized Tribe in the State of Alabama. This government-to-government relationship with the United States gives certain inherent rights of self-government, commonly referred to as tribal sovereignty. I am excited to celebrate this special 30th Anniversary of our federal recognition with you at the Annual Sovereignty Celebration on August 30, 2014!

As a Tribe, we should always remember the importance of our culture and traditions. For example, the Green Corn Ceremony is an annual renewal ceremony held in mid-summer when the early corn becomes ripe. This ceremony has been an important tradition to us as Creek people for hundreds of years. To explain the significance of the Green Corn Ceremony, anthropologist Charles Hudson said, "modern Americans would have to combine Thanksgiving, New Year's Day, Yom Kippur, Lent, and Mardi Gras to have a holiday that approached the breadth and importance of the Green Corn Ceremony".

In closing, thank you in advance for your patience as the Tribal Chair's office transitions. I am working with my staff to evaluate our current organizational structure so that we can provide the very best service to you. As you can imagine, these efforts require focus, strategic planning, input from multiple individuals, and TIME! I apologize if my office has been delayed in replying to you. Please know that your concerns and suggestions are important to us, and we are working very diligently on your behalf.

I hope that everyone continues to have a happy and safe summer. Much love to you all and may God bless you and our Tribe!

The proclamation reads in part, "Under Chairman Rolin's leadership, Poarch Band of Creek Indians has been very generous in supporting the City's endeavors to improve the quality of life for the residents of our City, and on behalf of the citizens of Atmore and our City government, I would like to express our sincere appreciation."

Rolin recently retired after serving the Tribe for fifty years, the last eight as Tribal Chairman, leading one of the most prosperous periods in

PCI history.

Press Release dated June 30, 2014 United South & Eastern Tribes (USET) Submitted by Brandon Stephens

For the third year high school and college students from USET member Tribes are attending the Aspirnaut[™] Summer Research Internship Program at Vanderbilt University Medical Center (VUMC) in Nashville. ASPIRNAUT[™] is a hands-on and mentored basic science laboratory experience for diverse high school and undergraduate students interested in a career in the fields of science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM). Interns join a scientific research team and are fully engaged in their research project-crafting of questions, designing and

conducting experiments, presenting and arguing results, and keeping their lab notebook and research portfolio. Interns are from several states and are provided a salary, room and board for their 6-10 week residential internship at VUMC.

The students have been in Nashville for a few weeks working on their internships. Today (June 30, 2014) the students visited USET to learn more about the organization and to share their experiences about the Aspirnaut[™] program. In previous years the students have been working with VUMC to enhance treatment for diseases, identifying resources to assist with physical fitness, and some engineering work. The Aspirnaut [™] program has a goal to enrich STEM education, promote critical thinking or problem solving, and to give the students more resources to pursue their educational opportunities after high school or during college. USET Tribal Health Program Support Director Dee Sabattus says this is a great characteristic of the program, "One of the greatest things about the program is that the staff at AspirnautTM are truly invested in each of their intern's future. They aren't just teaching a summer course and saying goodbye at the end. The staff teach, guide, and mentor the students for as long as they need them, often times throughout high

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school and into undergraduate programs. They build upon their strengths to help the students accomplish their educational goals."

The students may not pursue a career or education in a STEM field. Aspirnaut [™] has another goal to help future Tribal leaders gain an understanding of how and why innovations in STEM occur. USET Executive Director Kitcki Carroll talked to the students saying, "We are excited to have this program and we will work to keep it going so it will assist you with your educational and professional career aspirations. We (Indian Country) need students in the STEM areas and there are many opportunities for you to make an impact in Indian Country.

Aspirnaut[™] summer interns for 2014 include:

<u>Taloa Berg (Mississippi Band of Choctaw)</u> – Taloa has been in the Aspirnaut[™] program for three years, is serving as a Resident Advisor this summer for the high school interns, and Plans to pursue a career in a STEM field with a focus on serving the medical needs of the American Indian community. She will be a sophomore at Vanderbilt this coming fall.

<u>Deon Denson (Mississippi Band of Choctaw)</u> – This is Deon's second year in the AspirnautTM program. He plans to pursue a career in veterinary medicine. This year Deon is working on a project to determine what causes metabolites to increase or decrease in human body. Metabolites have a directing effect on enzyme activity.

Robert York (Mississippi Band of Choctaw) – This is the first year attending Aspirnaut[™] for Robert, who is a rising junior at Choctaw Central High School. York wants to pursue a career in dermatology. He is working on a project this year to determine the best support for teens with Type I diabetes in order to maintain balance blood glucose levels. *Tanner Liddy (Poarch Band of Creek Indians)* – This is also Tanner's first year attend Aspirnaut[™]. He is a rising senior at Adamsville High School and plans to pursue a degree in biomedical engineering. He is working on examining the pathology of organs from mice.

<u>Kaitlyn Alvord (Navajo Nation)</u> – This is the first year for Kaitlyn to attend Aspirnaut[™]. She is a rising junior at Cranbrook Upper School in Michigan and plans to pursue a career in surgery. She is working on a project that involves the contextual fear conditioning of chemotherapy. Kaitlyn is the only American Indian student this year attending Aspirnaut[™], who is not from a USET member Tribe.

The 2014 Aspirnaut[™] interns will conclude their work in the coming week and return home. Undergraduate students like Taloa Berg will continue work through the remainder of the summer break. "I am planning to apply to schools that are in larger cities like Georgia Tech, Duke, and Vanderbilt. This program (Aspirnaut[™]) has helped me get used to the work, the city life. Nashville is a city, but not that big to me now," Tanner Liddy told USET. The group was also visited by the Indian Health Service (IHS) Nashville Area Office Director Martha Ketcher, who explained the services IHS provides and the education and employment opportunities that exist in the agency.

"We continuously work to know and understand our past from our elders and preserve the legacy they leave for us to build upon. We will fail to preserve that legacy if we fail to nurture our younger generations and prepare them for the future. USET has made programs like Aspirnaut[™] a priority and we thank our partners at Vanderbilt for helping us rebuild our Tribal nations," USET President Brian Patterson stated.

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his grandmother's life. Luke is a Boy Scout and has received awards for his bravery when his family lost their home to a fire. Kay wrote the following letter to the Boy Scouts of America to let them know that his training continues to prepare him to respond heroically in times of need:

Dear Friends,

While I was on vacation with my grandson, Luke Vega, who is one of your proud scouts, we had a life and death situation to present itself.

I became ill and was vomiting uncontrollably, extremely dizzy and unable to help myself. I had a GI Bleed from an ulcer that I was not aware of.

This wonderful 11 year old grandson of mine had the peace of mine and the intelligence to know what to do. He called 911 and told them that I was on the floor of the bathroom, had been vomiting something black. He then, while still on the phone with paramedics, went to the front desk of the hotel and had someone to come back to the room and take over the phone. He had been asked earlier to give the location of where we were and all he knew was that we were maybe in a Best Western and on the beach. We had only just arrived when I started to become sick and it was just the two of us. After he called 911 and contacted the front desk, he then placed a call to his mom and dad in Georgia to let them know of the crisis.

When EMT's arrived I was already semi-conscious. Based on what they saw they told him that he had saved my life. I was minutes from death. (Later this was confirmed by the doctor and hospital staff.)

Because he was 11 years old, he had to ride in the ambulance with me to the hospital. At this time I was unaware of what was going on with me for 2-3 days. I was told of Luke's bravery and quick thinking, and that they had to give me 4 units of blood, and that Luke's parents had driven all night to get to the hospital and Luke had been right there in the room with me. When I awoke I saw my daughter, her husband, and Luke. I was so glad to see them all because it made me realize that I was still alive. I have never been that sick in my 70 years and pray that I will never be again. When asked if he had been scared, Luke replied that he was very worried.

Their journey would not be a peaceful one. Heading southward towards Pensacola, historian Albert Pickett recalled, "On their way they beat and drove off every Indian that would not take the war-talk" and upon their arrival at Burnt Corn Spring, at the crossing of the Pensacola and Federal Roads, Pickett also recorded "...they burned the house and corn crib of James Cornells, seized his wife and carried her with them to Pensacola, where she was sold to Madame Baronne, a French lady, for a blanket. A man, named Marlowe, living with Cornells, was also carried prisoner to Pensacola." James Cornells, who was not at home during the incident, quickly spread the word of the hostiles and what had happened. News of the Redsticks in Pensacola and possible impending attacks sent the settlers of

the Tombigbee and Tensaw areas into a state of panic. Many began abandoning their farms and taking refuge in the various forts situated along the Tombigbee/Tensaw areas. Judge Tomlin, observing the panicked settlers, wrote on July 23, 1813: "The people have been fleeing all night."

Colonel Joseph Carson, the

Commander at Fort Stoddart, sent David Tate and William Pierce to the Pensacola as spies to examine the intentions of the Redsticks Creeks and whether or not Governor Manique would grant them their requests.

Elder Care is on everyone's minds as we age. When we are young, we believe that we will be the fortunate ones to live our lives healthy and whole. The truth is that most of us will need some type of supportive services during our lifetime. Sometimes the support needed is a result of someone else's misfortune or mistakes, but in either case, we need help from someone or someplace other than ourselves.

Poarch Creek Indians has several program and services in place to help take care of our elderly and disabled. Some of the ways our Family Services Department's Adult Service Unit is helping is by providing:

- <u>Assessment</u> meeting with the Tribal Member and/or family to determine the actual need.
- <u>Referral services</u> Tribal Members who need services other than those provided by the Family Services Department will be connected to those services and assisted as needed to access their benefits.
- <u>Intervention</u> working with the Tribal Member and/or family to work through the problem to arrive at a safe and healthy solution.
- <u>Case management</u> helping the individual to heal and remain safe and healthy.

- <u>Homemaker</u> Provides light housekeeping, grocery shopping, companionship, local transportation, and awareness of the Tribal resources available to allow them to remain at home safely. The department has five homemaker positions to serve the five county service area. Services are not provided outside of this five county service area.
- <u>Respite care</u> The provision of shortterm, temporary relief to those who are caring for family members who might otherwise require permanent placement in a facility outside the home. This service is in home care provided by a licensed agency for Tribal Member households who have a family member who requires 24 hour care and is never left alone. This service is available to any Tribal Member household and is not limited to the 5 county service area.

All applications for any services continue to be accepted and approved at the Family Services Department located on the second floor of the Health Department.

- If parent is a full time student, must have documentation on school letterhead with logo (can also provide school schedule with logo).
- Copy of social security cards of all household members.
- Copy of Tribal I.D. for Tribal Members or Letter of Indian Descent for First Generation Children.
- Verification from daycare or afterschool care provider to confirm that your child is enrolled in the program and the weekly rate of services.
- Must live within the Five County Service Area.

All documentation must be current.

If you are currently receiving CCDF assistance, you must complete a new application for the new certification period. No existing child care participants will automatically be renewed for daycare services.

Grant funding is limited. Services will be offered on a first come, first served basis as our funding allows. No applications will be processed without all documentation.

SMART stands for Self-Management And Recovery Training. SMART Recovery is a self-help, abstinencebased program for people who want to kick an alcohol or drug or other addictive habit. Using principles of psychology, individuals help themselves to kick a problem habit, prevent relapses, and address habit-related personal problems.

SMART Recovery meetings are open to all who are interested. There are no requirements. Meetings are focused on current problems and challenges that participants are facing and open dialogue and discussion. The goals are 1.) Learning how to increase motivation to quit, 2.) Handling urges without acting on them, 3.) Developing new ways of coping with problems, and 4.) Creating a healthy, positive lifestyle.

SMART Recovery is a psychological approach to recovery that is not in any way 12-step related. Consumer Confidence Report

During the month of June 2014, the PCI Utilities Authority successfully distributed the 2013 Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) to our valuable customers. If anyone is interested in a copy of the 2013 CCR, you can obtain one at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) located on 263 Aplin Road.

Utilities has continued connecting additional customers, including a community church, to our growing system.

The Headwork's Upgrade Project on site at the WWTP is currently under construction. The project is being facilitated by W.D. Rogers Contractor out of Pensacola, Florida.

Construction has begun on a new Pole Barn at WWTP that will adequately store Utility assets to help extend the life expectancy of each asset.

The installation of the shielded liner at the Sunset Lift Station is complete. This upgrade will correct infiltration and premature corrosion that the station was experiencing.

We have received the dumpsters for the new solid waste handling process, but we are still waiting on the implementation of the new containers and the delivery of the new solid waste truck which should arrive in the near future.

PCI Utilities is working to develop projects for future grant funding sources that will help us to better serve our customers and community.
