




## Alabama's Only Federally Recognized Tribe




For generations, we were a largely forgotten people. The Poarch Creek Indians are descendants of a segment of the original Creek Nation that once covered most of Alabama and Georgia. Unlike many Tribes, our ancestors were not removed during the Trail of Tears, and have lived together for nearly two centuries in and around Poarch, Alabama. Our reservation is near Atmore, Alabama, some 57 miles northeast of Mobile.
