#### **Our Heritage**

As descendants of a segment of the original Creek Nation, the Poarch Creek Indians have a rich heritage. This nation once covered most of Alabama and Georgia, and can trace its roots to the Paleo-Indian period. Our ancestors lived along the Alabama, Coosa, and Tallapoosa Rivers, including areas from Wetumpka south to the Tensaw settlement. The Treaty of Fort Jackson, in 1814, forever changed the face of the great Creek Nation, as more than 21 million acres of Creek Indian land were ceded to the United States. In 1830, the historic Indian Removal Act imposed the resettlement of the Creek Nation from the remaining lands to present-day Oklahoma; this journey is known as The Trail of Tears. However, several Creek leaders and their families, because of their service in protecting Creek and White settlers, received land grants, in 1814, and again in 1836, which became the home of today's Poarch Creek Indians in southern Alabama.

#### **Our Purpose**

In 1984, the Poarch Creek Indians became the only federally recognized Tribe in the state of Alabama. Through the turn of the 20th century, the Poarch settlement was largely ignored and impoverished. In the 1940s, Tribal leaders took action to improve community conditions and educational opportunities, and, in 1950, more formal leadership was established, with a dedicated leader of a formal governing body. Currently, there are more than 2,800 citizens of the Tribe who possess at least 1/4 Poarch Creek blood quantum. The Reservation is located eight miles northwest of Atmore, AL, in rural Escambia County. The Poarch Creek Indians has fought hard to preserve its proud heritage while moving forward into today's modern society.

Poarch Creek is governed by a 9-Member Tribal Council. Our governmental structure is made up of a Legislative Branch, Executive Branch, and Judicial Branch.

The mission of the Poarch Creek Indians continues to guide our Tribe toward a position of self-sufficiency and good citizenship in the community. With a fully functioning Tribal Government and more than 2,800 Tribal Citizens, the Tribe provides essential services such as healthcare, public safety, and education.

#### **ALABAMA NATIVES**

The Poarch Creek Indians are the only federally recognized Indian Tribe in the State of Alabama, operating as a sovereign nation with our own system of government and bylaws. We are a surviving segment of the original Creek Nation that once covered almost all of Alabama and Georgia and have lived together for almost 200 years in and around the reservation in Poarch, Alabama. We have fought hard to preserve our proud heritage and maintain our identity and inherent right to self-govern.

#### ALABAMA NEIGHBORS

We are united in our mission to serve. Stories of the Tribe's history and culture, and the work we do to improve life for our Alabama neighbors, bring into focus a deeper truth—that good will and a strong community can build a better world for all. We are a nation with lands that border other communities, and we care deeply about the people who call these communities home. Our care and concern for others is not defined by borders or proximity. We are part of Alabama's history, its present, and its future.

Meaning "big water," OWA Parks & Resort is the perfect place to thrill, chill, reconnect, and spend your day exactly as you wish.

Award-winning OWA Parks & Resort in Coastal Alabama is owned and operated by the Poarch Creek Indians. This business is managed by the Creek Indian Enterprise Development Authority, the economic development arm of PCI. OWA's tropical theme of the 520-acre property was inspired by the Gulf of Mexico, minutes away via the Foley Beach Express.

At the heart of OWA is Tropic Falls, which includes 23 theme-park rides, an outdoor wave pool, and the region's largest indoor water park, covered by a convertible roof. Just outside the ticketed areas is Downtown OWA. This pedestrian-only streetscape was inspired by Southern small towns and features numerous options for dining, shopping, and entertainment.

The destination resort offers a full calendar of events, from Downtown OWA's own Mardi Gras Parade to the annual Christmas tree lighting with fireworks and snowfall. With its own award-winning TownePlace Suites by Marriott, OWA is the place in Coastal Alabama to thrill, then chill.














#### **WILDLIFE RESERVE**

When you think of relaxation and fun, what comes to mind? If you love the outdoors, then Magnolia Branch Wildlife Reserve is perfect for you and your family and friends. Tucked deep into the woods off Highway 113 south of Interstate 65 sits a vast amount of natural campgrounds and entertainment for all guests.

We offer 47 full amenity RV sites that include water, electric and sewer and 20 RV sites with water and electric hook ups so patrons can bring their RVs and have the comforts of home while enjoying the serene environment.

Magnolia Branch also has 15 tent camp sites with water and electric as well as primitive camping, allowing guests to become one with nature.

Perdido River Farms (PRF) consists of 2,900 acres of Tribal owned agricultural properties supporting a sustainable herd of cattle which produces USDA-inspected beef for the public.

PRF is conscientious about maintaining, protecting, and preserving the land, and works closely with the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service Tribal Office to implement best stewardship practices for the farm. PRF partners with USDA agencies, state agencies and other organizations to provide educational venues and training opportunities to help inform Tribal Citizens, landowners and agency staff of the various programs available to assist them in best management practices of their natural resources. PRF is continually improving beef quality, as well as providing enough hay to feed its cattle and sell the excess to the public.

Opened in February 2025, Perdido River Meats specializes exclusively in beef products and offers the unique opportunity for customers to have their own cattle processed or to purchase whole and half cows directly from the facility.

The \$29 million state-of-the-art facility is approximately 23,000 sq ft, with a retail storefront dedicated to both consumer and wholesale customers. This facility allows the Tribe to offer great quality beef to the South Alabama area while creating around 15 new full-time positions for Escambia County, Alabama.

### MUSEUM & WELCOME CENTER

Kerrtv en Cuko – Building of Learning

The museum is the place to experience the history of our Tribe firsthand. Our exhibit showcases how our ancestors—the Muskogee Creek Indians—lived with samples of stoneware, pottery, tools, baskets, and textiles. See what early village life was like for families living and farming together.

The Poarch Creek Indians Museum has examples of baskets produced in the traditional way along with other traditional forms of Creek art, including pottery, textiles, shellwork, copper tooling, and quilting. You'll also see artifacts that are special to the Poarch Creek Indians specifically, such as original copies of the Petition for Federal Recognition submitted to the United States Department of the Interior in 1980.

#### ANNUAL THANKSGIVING POW WOW

The Poarch Creek Indians Annual Thanksgiving Pow Wow is a 2-day homecoming celebration with families, friends and neighbors that always falls on Thanksgiving Day and the Friday after. Visitors enjoy unique crafts and goods for sale by local artisans and vendors, and we have festival favorite foods such as barbeque, oak wood fire-roasted corn, buffalo burgers, ham, and fried chicken.

Activities include: intertribal dance competitions for men and women, young and old, as well as a drum contest and the Poarch Creek Indian Princess Contest.

#### SOUTHEASTERN INDIAN FESTIVAL

The Southeastern Indian Festival is hosted by the Cultural Department for the public with a major attendance made by visiting schools from the surrounding area. This event focuses on accurately portraying, and offering education on the rich and vast culture of the various tribes found traditionally in the Southeast. Throughout this event, various demonstrations on traditional dance styles, traditional stories, living history, etc. are offered.

Activities include: song & dance, storytelling, living history, arts/crafts demonstrations, authentic Indian foods, and stickball games.
